Hundreds of Titles

Each year the Friends budget for a grant to the Vinalhaven School Library. The items purchased using this year's \$2,000 grant were enthusiastically welcomed by School Librarian Taylor Leach and the students.

Taylor said, "This donation is helping put some key series in our library that our kids have been clamoring for, along with others that I am hoping will get our students reading! I was able to place an order of well over 100 books ranging from completing series, picking up duplicates of some graphic novels that have been in high demand, some hunting and boat repair guides, and so much more!

"Within a day of books arriving I already had kids reaching out about books from series they had been waiting for, so some of the books have already been rapidly processed into the system and are already in the hands of students across the island."

Conversation with a Reader:

Taylor Leach, School Librarian

Taylor Leach started working as our school librarian last fall and has loved living on Vinalhaven and being our librarian! Her background is in early childhood education, and she loves working with the "littles" but has discovered an appreciation and enjoyment of working with middle and high school students too. I can relate to that, having worked with all ages when I was the school librarian.

Taylor was born and raised in Sycamore, Illinois, about an hour outside of Chicago. After graduating, Taylor moved around a bit, and then one summer came to the coast of Maine where she has extended family. She worked as a nanny and then worked as a guide on a lobster boat tour out of Rockport. She loved being on the water and discovered she loved Maine and made the decision to settle here.

We sat down in the school library to talk about books. I noticed how much the library has changed since I sat at the desk. Libraries have changed a great deal to meet the needs of an ever-changing society and Taylor is doing a great job of meeting those needs. I started with my usual first question: What do you remember about being read to as a child?

Taylor's mother was a "voracious reader" and read everything. On Friday mornings she would take Taylor to the local bagel shop and then they would go to the public library. She remembers her mom reading lots of different series to her: the Harry Potter series (she has a tattoo because of Harry!), A Series of Unfortunate Events, The Bailey School Kids. She had lots of exposure to books at a young age. Her favorite picture book was Go, Dog, Go! She still enjoys reading series for children and one of her favorites right now is the Nevermoor series by Jessica Townsend.

I noticed that she has added many new books to the library, and she told me that she is grateful to the Friends of the Library for their support. Also, when there were funds left over from the granite bench made in memory of Amy Wadsworth and Angelina Turner, the family donated that money to the library for new books. Taylor has bought about 100 books with this money, and each has a special memorial bookplate. The library also received money from the Widow's Island Fund for a Stephen King book club (for older students). They read some of his books and then took a trip to Bangor to see where King lives.

Taylor describes herself as an eclectic reader. She does read for escapism, though, and especially enjoys fantasy

series such at *Nevermoor*, *OwlCrate* selections, and *Sorcery of Thorns*. Two of her favorite authors are Liz Braswell (*Twisted Tales*) and Mary Shelley (the classic *Frankenstein*). *Frankenstein* and *Great Expectations* are two of her favorite classics, which she read in school and loved. Taylor also reads many nonfiction and history books.

Besides fantasy, Taylor says that she is a "sucker for a good dystopian novel" like *Lord of the Flies* or *FantasticLand*. She does not really enjoy romance books and leaves the thriller and horror genre for daytime reading, as some of the books have proven to be very scary.

She met two award-winning authors through the Island Readers and Writers program at our school. IRW brings authors and illustrators to Maine island schools; our students have been so fortunate to be part of this program. This year Taylor met Caldecott Award winner Sophie Blackall and Lauren Wolk (Newbery Honor, Scott O'Dell Award). For librarians and students these are big deals!

Taylor says she is happy reading ebooks and print books, and listens to audiobooks as well. In the past she has read up to 120 books in one year, but usually it's closer to 45. However, this year she has been so busy that she feels good with reading one or two a month. She chooses books

to read based on recommendations and often rereads books that she enjoyed.

Presently, Taylor is reading *Blue Spaces: How & Why Water Can Make You Feel Better, Neuro Tribes: The Legacy of Autism and the Future of Neurodiversity, Carrie* (for book club), and her drop-everything-and-read book (DEAR, which is a staple for Vinalhaven School) is *The Four Winds.* Next on her list is one by local author Janaan Sherman titled *Walking on Air: The Aerial Adventures of Phoebe Omlie.* Taylor is sitting in the perfect place to find new books to read!
