Conversation with a Reader:

Lacey Robinson

Many of you know Lacey as the friendly and calm cashier at Carver's Harbor Market. I've known her for a long time, but we've never talked books before. I didn't realize what a reader and lover of books she was until a friend mentioned it to me. Lacey has always appeared reserved, and I wondered if she might be hesitant to be interviewed, but she didn't think twice about it. We set up a time to talk and I learned that we both like a lot of the same books and both use reading to relax.

I asked Lacey what she remembers about being read to as a child. She said that her mother was a reader and read to her often. She had a stack of the Little Golden Books that were read to her repeatedly. She remembers one of her early teachers, either Alicia Watts or Pam Alley, reading Newberry: The Life & Times of a Maine Clam. She loved it and was thrilled when she got to read it to her boys but a bit disappointed that they didn't love it the way she did.

The first books that got her reading more were the Sweet Valley High series and Scary Stories to Tell in the Dark. I can attest to the popularity of both from my time as a school librarian – especially the Scary Stories books! There's something about reading horror stories that really excites some kids and leads them to other horror stories. Lacey has moved on from the horror genre, but she does love a good mystery. She reads books by authors such as Karin Slaughter and Paul Doiron. She also liked Sue Grafton's Alphabet series. I agreed that they are fun to read. We talked about our enjoyment of murder mysteries and exchanged the names of a few titles and authors.

I learned we had more reading interests in common. Her favorite book is *Gone With the Wind*. Lacey rereads it every three or four years. I remember reading it a few times when I was a teenager. It was a bit of a coming-ofage story in my household. My mother loved it and passed it on to her daughters and we all read it and loved it.

We also share a love of the Tide Trilogy series by Elizabeth Ogilvie. These books are set on a fictional island from about the 1930s-1950s, but we know it is based on Criehaven, and lobstering plays into the story in a big way. She said she "would have liked to live back then when life seemed much simpler."

As a regular visitor to our Town Library, Lacey loves browsing the collection and talking with Scott and Linda about books. If she doesn't find a book that draws her in, she has quite a selection of books at home that she will reread. I asked her if there was a classic book that she had to read but didn't like. She thought *A Tale of Two Cities* was too boring and dry for her. Scott happened to be her English teacher that year and she teases him about making her read it!

She enjoys reading physical books rather than e-books and reads three to four a month. She often reads while she's eating and her books can get a bit messy, so she couldn't imagine what an e-reader would look like when she was done with it!

Presently, Lacey is reading a Mike Bowditch mystery (by Paul Doiron) set in Maine near the Canadian border. She plans on finishing this series before moving on to a new one.

"You'll always find me with a book in my hands. I'm not much of a TV watcher – I find books more interesting."

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
